CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

1. At the beginning of each academic session, college prepares its proposed academic calendar, which is uploaded in the college website. The proposed academic calendar is prepared by considering the notices and circulars received from the affiliating university and the holiday list of the Government of West Bengal. Students are informed about the academic calendar of the college notifying the probable teaching days, dates of internal examinations, curricular, extension related and co-curricular activities 2. Orientation programme is organized every year for newly admitted students to make them aware of the mechanism for curriculum delivery and implementation 3. Routine committee of the college prepares the master routine strictly in accordance to the number of credit points mentioned in the prescribed university syllabus of each course offered by the departments. Routine is prepared by the routine committee for all generic courses, all programs and honours classes of arts departments (since arts departments use shared classrooms). Classes for honours courses of science departments are scheduled by the concerned departments after considering the allotted generic courses and programs of the master routine. Commerce classes are held in the morning session and hence the routine for commerce department is prepared by the department. 4. Based on the departmental routine, departments conduct meetings to allot classes and syllabus distribution. Students are given details of teaching assignment of each teacher at the beginning of a session and accordingly, the teaching plan is prepared 5. Along with the traditional chalk and talk method, teachers often use power-

point projections. Lecture materials, assignments etc are also uploaded to the MOODLE site by two departments 6. Class tests/surprise test and student seminars are held after completion of a section of the syllabus and periodic review of performance of students is undertaken 7. Tutorial classes are held in some departments within class routine hours for which separate attendance registers are maintained 8. Classes are also held during the summer and puja vacations every year to keep pace with the curriculum of CBCS 9. Field tours are organized by Departments of Geology, Botany, Zoology and Conservation biology 10. Post-graduate students are specially trained to handle assignments, open-house seminars and dissertations 11. Interactive sessions with students and, sometimes with guardians are held to identify problem areas. Special care is taken to address the problems of slow learners, advanced learners and first generation learners. 12. Student satisfaction survey is conducted by IQAC to improve the teaching-learning process of each department 13. In the academic session 2019-2020, college has introduced a formal student mentoring system. During the lock-down period, teachers have continued the mentoring process through different online modes such as Google Meet, Google Classroom, Messages, Phone Calls etc 14. During the sudden outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic situation, college was closed from 16th March 2020 under the directives of the State Government. Teachers continued teaching and completed syllabus through different online platforms and also by providing class lecture materials and video lectures to students

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentoring of students is conducted by the full time teachers of the departments of the institution. Students have been allotted to each full time teacher by the department. The formal student mentoring system has been introduced in the academic session 2019-2020. IQAC has been trusted to preserve the records of the mentoring system as received from the departments and to provide necessary assistance and suggestions to the departments as and when required. Mentoring of students is based on following objectives:

- Promoting the academic, moral, social and cultural development and physical fitness of students
- Increasing teacher-student contact hours
- Identifying and addressing the problems faced by slow learners and first generation learners
- Encouraging advanced learners with additional resources
- Decreasing the student drop-out rates
- Building up confidence among students and preparing students for the competitive world
- Encouraging students to participate in sports, cultural and extension related activities

Responsibilities of the mentor (some important points but are not limited to the following):

- Mentors will meet the mentee at least twice in a month/online interactions should be maintained with the students in case of unavoidable circumstances or pandemic situations
- Continuous monitoring, guiding and motivating the students in all academic matters through online and face-to face mode
- Contacting the parents/guardians of the students as and when required to inform them about the performance and academic irregularities
- Build up the confidence of mentee to face competitions, public gathering and other social interactions
- Skill development of the mentee by providing special training such as basic computation, advanced computation, programming, language delivery, editorial writing, article writing, spoken English etc.
- Encouraging the mentee to participate in extension related, co-and extracurricular and cultural activities and also providing necessary help and support as and when required
- Nurturing the hobbies of the mentee
- Career counselling and providing professional guidance to students by the mentor teacher and providing them proper information and guidance
- Intimate HOD in case of any problems faced by the student in the department
- Keep contact with the students after graduation or post-graduation
- Preparing a record of the mentoring system of each academic year and sharing it with the IQAC
- Maintaining a brief but clear record of all discussions with the students

During the COVID-19 Lockdown period, Mentors have kept interactions with mentee through online mode. Mentoring activities have shown some significant outcome this year. The pass percentage has shown improvement compared to the previous year. One student of Department of Chemistry has been selected for online CSIR Summer Internship of 2020 during the lockdown period. One student has got first Position in Age Group U-20 Years Boys, in International Online Yoga Championship-June 2020. 14 students (Chemistry (02), Geology (07), Physics (04) and Mathematics (01) have been cleared all India JAM examinations in 2020. Three students have won prizes in Inter College Sports Inter College State Games Sports Championship-2019-2020 (District Level). Two students have won medals in Rock Climbing.

• For the odd semester 2019, continuous internal evaluation was conducted through different mechanisms such as regular class tests, student seminars, field surveys in some subjects, assignments, presentations, viva-voce, dividing students into groups-each group comprising academically strong and not-so-strong students and made to discuss and write assignments together contribution/ knowledge gained by members of the group was tested through interactions, preparation of innovative learning modulus on special topics involving students by asking them to frame relevant questions on a topic, group discussions, quiz etc • Due to the sudden outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, the continuous internal evaluation was conducted through fully online system. Online assignments of students was taken through learning management system (Free online MOODLE site) by Departments of Chemistry and Physics and also by sending e-mails to students, Other departments have used e-mails, whatsapp, Google Classroom, TCSion portal, Google Meet, TeamLink and other web platforms for continuous internal evaluation of students.

6.5.2 – Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association (at least three)

Durgapur Government College believes in the academic, social, moral and cultural development of students by acquiring inputs from all stakeholders. Although the college does not maintain formally registered parent-teacher association, yet interactions of teachers with parents during parent-teacher meetings of different departments come up with new suggestions related to the overall development of the students. Mentors and the Department monitor the attendance of students. If a student shows poor attendance, then parents are informed about the same and subsequently meetings are arranged by the college authority with the parents. In almost all cases, parents provide essential support and care to ensure proper attendance of their ward. Joint efforts of parents and faculty members has ensured good representation of girl students in field based subjects such as botany, zoology, conservation biology and geology, which require field trainings to different parts of West Bengal and India. More than 60 percent students of this institution are female students. Teachers have been able to communicate with parents to prevent early marriages and other prejudices related to the drop-out of girl students. This has resulted in the increase in overall percentage of girl students in the college.

I. Providing an informative, interesting, technological and comfortable learning space is the main goal of this initiative.

II. The Context Computer-aided methods help a teacher to present his or her knowledge in a simple and interesting manner with clarity. Audio-visual demonstrations especially by the help of 3D animated modules remain forever in a students mind. Teachers can remain always connected with the students through computer aided methods. Research activities achieve excellence by the use of computer aided methods.

III. The Practice •All students and faculty members of the institution have been registered to TCS ion Classroom so that they can maintain efficient interaction. All departments have been provided with computer, LCD projectors for teaching. Two smart classrooms have been started for Department of Chemistry and Department of Physics. The college has also procured new computers for the central computer laboratory. Teachers use online learning management platforms such as MOODLE to upload their teaching materials, provide assignments to students and also monitor the progress of students. Teachers have uploaded their video lectures to youtube channels to make them accessible to students as and when required. During the pandemic situation due to sudden outbreak of COVID-19, teachers have continued their mentoring process through questionnaire and providing necessary suggestions to students through e-mails.

IV. Evidence of Success • The use of computer-aided methods had enriched the teaching-learning and evaluation process and hence has considerably increased the success ratio of students in university examinations. 14 students have qualified for JAM examinations with flying colours. 14 students have been placed in IITs for higher studies. This has increased participation of students in seminars and publishing papers in journals and book chapters. Students of Department of Botany and Chemistry have published book chapters and articles on international platform. Students have also won prizes in quiz competitions, debates and other events organized by external agencies Post-graduate students have completed different research based projects during the current year. 2. The college, being a state government institution (the sole public-funded college in Paschim Bardhaman district) has a nominal fee structure. Faculty members are appointed through Public Service Commission(PSC), which ensures

high quality of teachers, thus providing quality education under nominal fee structure. Several students get scholarships from State Government, which further ensures better education of the economically challenged students. 3. Apart from academic excellence, the college also pays sincere attention to the physical, moral and cultural development of students. Students have shown outstanding performance in sports tournaments and NCC Championships. College also actively encourages the organization of moral and cultural events such as observance of Swami Vivekanandas birthday, Nazrul Jayanti, Independence Day, Republic Day, Basanta Utsab, Rabindra Jayanti etc 4. College is quite sincere to prepare students for the competitive world. Students of Department of Geology, Chemistry and Physics have cleared JAM examinations and placed in IITs and other reputed institutes. Most of the departments have high student progression rate in higher studies 5. Professional and academic development of teachers is always encouraged. In the year 2018, faculty members have more than 42 publications,. In the year 2019, the number of such publications is about 16 till April 2019. In the year 2018 and 2019, faculty members have also been awarded research projects from DST and ICSSR. During the academic year 2019-2020, twenty one quality research papers have been published in UGC approved Care list journals. Faculty members have international collaborations for research activities. Faculty members participate in short term courses, orientation programmes and other training programmes. Technical and administrative staff of the college are appointed by Public Service Commission, and are provided necessary training and support by faculty members as and when required.
